Reason For Selection	These items relate to the first synthetic indigo dye produced in Japan. Natural indigo is one of the oldest dyes in the world and was a highly-valued import commodity in Europe until it was superseded by the successful achievement of synthetic indigo. It was industrialized in Japan by Miike Dye Works under Mitsui Mining Co., Ltd. using different technology from the German phenylglycine method industrialized in 1897 using aniline and monochloroacetic acid. Production volumes reached 1000 t in 1933. The manufactured indigo was stored and sold in barrels (1), and later exported in canisters (2) as production volumes increased. Although they no longer contain any actual indigo dye, these items are valuable pieces that speak of the history of dye development in Japan.
