Reason For Selection	At a time when long-playing records could only record for eight minutes, this uniquely Japanese technology capable of recording for 36 minutes was epochmaking. The emergence of popular kiyomoto, nagauta and rakugo performers in the 1930s made people keen to be able to record for 30 minutes or more at a time. At the time, recording was limited to eight minutes on the long-playing records and less than five minutes on the ordinary SP records. High hopes were on the emergence of a new means of making longer grooves or increasing the recording density. This device used an endless loop of film 13 m long and 35 mm wide wrapped around 23 times; by recording helically on the film for 100 revolutions, it was possible to record for 36 minutes.
