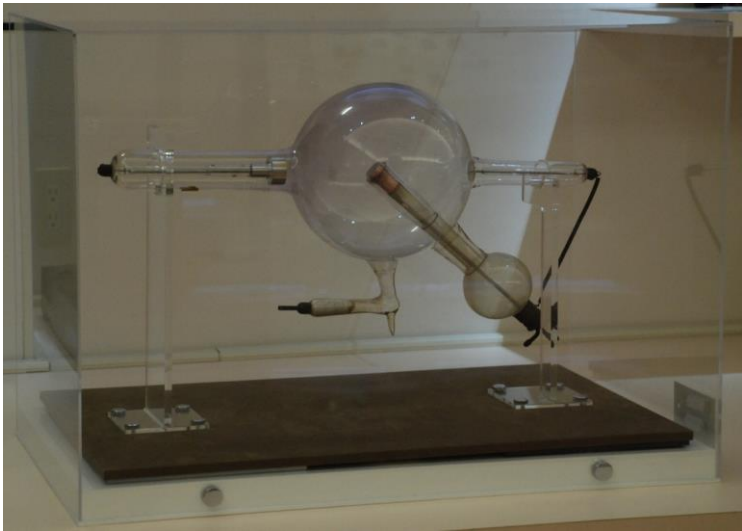

Reason For Selection	X-rays were discovered in 1895 by W.C. Roentgen and by around 1910, the use of x-rays in medicine began in Japan. During that time, the sale of x-ray tubes produced in Germany was under an oligopoly. When World War I broke out, its import was disrupted, greatly affecting the local medical industry. Tokyo Electric Co. then started research on local production of x-ray tubes by making use of the vacuum and tube technologies developed for light bulb manufacture, and in 1915, the GIBA x-ray tube, the first Japan-made x-ray tube, was completed. This triggered the growth of the field of radiology in Japan. The GIBA x-ray tube was named after a famous physician from ancient India.
