Reason For Selection	This is the oldest extant coin-operated beverage vending machine in Japan. There are various theories as to when it was built, but it was designed to accept a five sen copper coin that was minted between 1889 and 1897, so it was constructed sometime after 1889. The cabinet is made of wood, and an internal spring mechanism is tipped by the falling coin to dispense a fixed amount of sake. Although it is not clear exactly when it was made, the fact that this kind of coin-operated contraption survived is unusual, and it is significant as one of the first progenitors of vending machines in Japan. Apparently the device was used until about 1910.
